





Now the Vol State Emergency Medical Services faculty members get their turn and the newly purchased patient simulation manikin playing this role will give them a workout. The intensive two-day training will get the EMS instructors familiar with this latest piece of technology. The Laredal simulator is more than just a standard manikin, he seems

unnervingly human. He coughs, sweats and breathes. His pupils dilate, and the eyes open and close. He can simulate a cardiac arrest, collapsed lung and many other critical possibilities. He even reacts to drug cards flashed next to his IV line. If you don't get the dosage right-watch out!

Vol State students will have the opportunity to test their skills on the new manikin eventually. First, the Vol State EMS faculty members need to practice. While they're on the front lines for this training, in the future they will be behind a laptop hooked up to the manikin. It will allow them to monitor how students react and change the nature of the simulation to provide a





life-like set of circumstances. The goal is to run through a scenario in real-time, giving the students valuable training in a number of different situations. The Vol State folks trained with Flight Nurses from Vanderbilt University Medical Center LifeFlight. They plan to use the manikin for the training of rural nurses, paramedics, and physicians across Middle Tennessee.

Each generation of simulator manikins comes with new technology and features, designed for realism. The new Laredal manikins purchased by Vol State include two adult versions and one pediatric. Just remember: don't call the manikin a dummy. It's packed with enough technology to earn it a bit of respect.

Vol State Radiologic Technology Goes Wireless



It may look like a flat, black pad, but it's actually a revolution in radiologic technology. And that revolution may help you get in and out of the hospital quicker, if you ever need an x-ray. The device is called a wireless flat panel detector. It's the latest piece

of high-technology to be acquired by Volunteer State Community College for the Radiologic Technology program. It integrates with the Konica Image Pilot Computerized Radiography (CR) System bought by the College earlier this year.

Computerized Radiography allows radiologic technologists and radiologists, to crop, measure and invert an image to get a better look at a specific part of the body. The new wireless system makes the process nearly instantaneous. It sends the image straight to the CR system and displays it immediately. There's no waiting around for a cartridge to be moved to an intake machine or in the old days, an actual film to be developed. The image is ready to go, the patient is out the door and the doctor can take a look on a computer.

"It will give me a leg up when I go into a hospital setting," Vol State student Jeremy Scott of Lebanon said. "It's what many of the hospitals have now," said student Brittany Walls of Nashville. "It gives us the hands-on learning for something we'll be using in the workplace. We'll have experience with all three types of technology in radiologic, so we'll be ready for anything."

Students train in basic film, cartridge style CR imaging and now the full wireless CR imaging. The Radiologic program recently showed the new technology to clinical site coordinators and members of the advisory board. New Allied Health Building Construction To Start

Plans for a new Allied Health building for Volunteer State Community
College were recently unveiled. This building is to be constructed in the parking lot between the Mattox and Wallace buildings, with a walkway connection to Wallace. It will be a \$10 million project with specialized labs and classrooms. This artist rendering (pictured above) is the first step in the design process and there could be many changes down the road.

"Right now the plans are for the first floor to have Emergency Medical Services (EMS) and Health Information Technology (HIT)," said Allied Health Dean Elvis Brandon. "On the second floor, we'll have Ultrasound, Ophthalmic, Medical Lab Technology and Sleep Diagnostics." Dean Brandon says Allied Health programs often require particular equipment and layout considerations and the new building should make a big difference. "We've tried to make programs fit into spaces," he said. "Now, we will design spaces for the programs. This will be key for moving our programs forward and helping

them have even more success."


The project will begin next spring with the construction of new parking lots across the creek in the open green



American Baseball Dreams Do Come True

College athletes may dream of the day they get a call from a professional recruiter. Vol State alumni Steve Delabar got that call twice, and the latest is providing a big second chance with the Seattle Mariners. It's a story right out of the movies.

Delabar pitched for the Pioneers ten years ago. He blew out his elbow in the 2001-2002 baseball season and there were grave concerns about his major league hopes. In 2004, he finally made it to the San Diego Padre's minor league team and spent the next five years working through his injury in single A ball. The final straw came after he broke his elbow. Doctors wired it together using screws and a plate. Delabar left baseball and returned to his home of Elizabethtown, Kentucky. He worked as a substitute teacher and coached baseball for the local high school. All the while, he never stopped chasing the dream of pitching in the majors.

"I'm telling you, when it comes to baseball he is obsessed. Whether playing, working, or watching it on TV, it is all he thinks about," said Johnny Lynn, assistant baseball coach at Vol State. "He had already blown his elbow out before I got here. He was good, but he was not what he is now. During rehab he struggled throwing strikes, and

by the fifth inning he was out of the game. If you watch him now. . . he pounds the strike zone, and I would attribute that to maturity."

"When he was here, his velocity was probably 91-93 mph, but now he is pitching in the big league at 97-100 mph," said Vol State Baseball Coach Mike Crossland.

If it all sounds familiar, it should be. The story mirrors that of Jim Morris who was the subject of a 2003 movie called "The Rookie".

The 28 year-old Delabar was signed by the Seattle Mariners earlier this year and made his major league debut in September. The broadcast announcers talked breathlessly about the amazing second chance for Delabar as he took to the mound for the first time. The real moment came a few minutes later as Delabar blew 96 mile per hour pitches past the Kansas City Royals, retiring the side.

"He's a good kid from a good family," said Crossland. "This is good for him and his wife Jamie."

Vol State's Magic Softball Team

Victory! This word sums up the back-to-back insanity that the Vol State women's softball team felt when they won the final game of the TCCAA Region Seven Tournament. Three games in a row left the team exhausted and thrilled at the same time. "This is the first time in the history of our softball program we have won the state championship," said Head Coach Johnny Lynn.



This particular team seems to have a special magic about them. Shortstop, Whitney Ford, has been playing softball in Adams, Tennessee since she was a child. "I started playing baseball when I was five and then they made me move over to softball when I turned eight. I didn't want to at first," she said. "Mr. Lynn has been a really good coach. At first he made me mad, but I think it was because he knew what we were capable of and he would really push me. Now it makes me happy that I have

a coach that cares about me and wants to see me succeed and go far." Director of the Athletic program Bobby Hudson said "that was one of the gutsiest efforts I have ever seen from a team." Sophomore Jordan Runions is the catcher. "Our chemistry was crazygood. Throughout the whole year we have had our ups and downs but we have focused on staying together and playing as one. The difference is there is a passion and excitement at the heart of each player."

The team hit some serious challenges through the season. Right fielder Allyson Grooms, who is affectionately called Lil' Bit by friends, was a solid player across the board and held an important position on the hitting lineup. She was injured running to first base playing a game against Chattanooga. "I tore my ACL the first game we played Chat at home," said Grooms. "We won 9-8 at home, I made it to base and then somebody had to finish running for me, and my run scored and we won."

The rest of the team had to change the way they played. "We leaned on her a lot," said Freshman Whitney Ford. "She was in the second hole and batting really good and when she got hurt I had to move up into her spot. It put a lot of pressure on me, and I had to really step up my game."



Instead of throwing in the towel, the veteran player settled into a leadership role from the dugout.

"Lil' Bit was still in the dugout providing the team with her leadership skills," said Athletic Director Bobby Hudson. "She is a quality individual and has been a tremendous help. To make it to the Nationals, all the pieces have got to fall into place."

And fall into place they did. The Vol State Softball team won the Region 7 Championship giving them the right to head to St. George, Utah in May for the National Championships. The Lady Pioneers were eliminated from the National Tournament with a final score of 3-1 against Blinn College. This was the first time in the history of the program that the Vol State women's softball team has competed in the National Championship Tournament.

Vol State Students Commit To Completion

It's not enough for students to attend college; the goal should be to complete college. While this may seem like a rather obvious idea, in reality completion is tough for many students. Volunteer State Community College students are tackling the issue head-on with a new campus campaign. On Wednesday, students with the Phi Theta Kappa honors society encouraged their fellow

students to sign a banner to make a pledge to themselves to commit to completion. It's part of a national program called C4 for Community College Completion Corps. Tennessee lawmakers supported the effort in a series of remarks at the event. Senator Kerry Roberts, Representative Mike McDonald and Representative Debra Maggart attended. joining dozens of others in pledging to graduate or transfer to university.

Grammy Award Winning Recording Studio Engineer Hired At Vol State

Five Grammy awards, more than 20 years of recording experience, and work on more than 120 number one singles gives Steve Bishir plenty of credentials. The new Volunteer State Community College recording studio coordinator has engineered in studios across Nashville and around the world, including the famous Abbey Road Studios in London. He says though, that he wants to teach Vol State students the art of having a positive impact in the studio, while remaining in the background.

"You have to be somewhat malleable in your personality given some of the situations," Bishir said. "Someone good can anticipate what that next question or next request will be. A great assistant helps the recording process move along."

Vol State recording studio classes can help students get a foot in the door at studios as interns and eventually assistant engineers. Vol State grads are currently working in studios across Nashville. Bishir brings to the program years of experience working with artists such as Amy Grant, Vince Gill, Michael W. Smith, Nick Lachey and Steve Curtis Chapman. He was nominated for "Best Engineered Recording by the Grammy Committee. Bishir recorded the London Session Orchestra on more than 100 projects. He says the well equipped Vol State studio gives students a chance to get hands-on with some of the latest gear, including an Avid/Euphonix S5 Fusion Digital Audio Console with Eucon Technology.

"You have to build your palette of knowledge and that happens over time. You just need to do it. This is one of those things you can only learn by doing it."

Vol State offers a Recording Industry Management Program and Commercial Music Program. Music students also work in the studio on various projects during the year. 


