Clergyman John Wesley both summed up our purpose and gave us our charge in just 42 simple words: "Do all the good you can, by all the means you can, in all the ways you can, in all the places you can, at all the times you can, to all the people you can, as long as ever you can." And it was with this zeal and resolve that Dr. Orinthia T. Montague shown her light to many until she was called to a greater service on Sept. 22, 2023.

Born in Jamaica in 1967 and immigrating to the United States with her parents and five older siblings at the age of three, Orinthia lived a life of service to her family, her community and to humanity. She devoted her adulthood to ensuring access to the greatest gift society can give - education. First for herself, as a proud child of Missouri, she attended Truman State University and earned a bachelor's degree and progressed to earn a master's degree in counseling from Linwood College. She later earned the distinction of a doctorate in higher education administration from the University of Missouri-St. Louis.

Yet, for Orinthia, her soul was not full with her achievements; it was the achievements of students at the institutions and organizations at which she worked that brought joy and pride to her heart, from working as a high school social worker, to serving students in a youth group home facility, to returning to the halls of the university where she earned her Ph.D. to become a leader in student services. Though she ascended the academic ladder from associate provost and dean of students at her alma matter, to a vice president and dean at a community college in Minnesota, to become the third president of Tompkins-Cortland Community College in Ithaca, NY and the fourth president of Volunteer State Community College in Gallatin, TN, Dr. O. - as she was affectionately known - never lost her focus on what mattered most - students. An equity champion with a drive to create environments for students to learn and thrive, both inside and outside of the classroom, Orinthia put her positions of authority to work to design conditions that led to better student experiences, from addressing food insecurity by creating a food pantry, to bringing daycare services to campus for students and employees, to recently engaging in a process to overhaul the entire student services organization.

If Orinthia were to read these words, she would give a tilt of the head and flash that warm and infectious smile as an expression of gratitude for the sentiments and then would refocus our attention to that which was her motivation - not herself, but others - as she said, "I am driven by the desire to help others achieve their dreams through education."

The hearts of so many have been filled by Orinthia's love, including the love of her life, her husband of nearly 20 years, Michael McGhee; her mother, Linda Montague; one brother and three sisters and their respective families; her father and sister who preceded her call home; her sisters of the Gamma Omega Chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc.; countless friends and colleagues across the nation; and students whom she met and many she didn't, but all who benefited from her life, love, compassion, dedication, drive, focus and kindness.

For all who knew her and loved her and could call her wife, daughter, sister, aunt, leader, president, colleague and friend, know that Orinthia Montague did all the good she could, by all the means she could, in all the ways she could, in all the places she could, at all of the times she could, for all of the people she could, for as long as she could. And for that, we should celebrate, cherish, and be proud that we knew Orinthia Montague.
